### EAST ROCHESTER POLICE DEPARTMENT

We are also amenable to special requests. Permission may be granted to allow parking under special circumstances. We will take a telephone number where the person can be reached and officers will contact them to remove the vehicle in the event the roads need to be cleared of vehicles. When possible, officers have gone to residences in an attempt to get vehicles moved prior to towing. Regardless, people are advised that should plowing be needed, the vehicles will have to be moved or they will be towed. This especially holds true for disabled vehicles. In the event that a State of Emergency is declared within the Town/Village of East Rochester for snow related reasons, all vehicles will be removed from the streets.

**Winter Parking Rules**  
The following outlines the procedures for ticketing and towing of vehicles from November 15 through April 15 when winter parking regulations are in effect per Village Policy and Law. Prior to November 15, the regulations are posted in the East Rochester Post and the Democrat and Chronicle. In addition, an ad is placed in the Community News and posted on Cable Channel 12. There are signs at the entrances to the Village outlining the regulation.

The East Rochester Police Department issues only warning tickets for the first week. After that, parking tickets are issued to any vehicle on the street between 3:00 to 6:00 am whether or not there is inclement weather. This includes the Village Hall parking lot located at 120 West Commercial Street. In the event that it is necessary for snow removal, the vehicles are issued parking tickets and then towed.

## ER FIRE DEPARTMENT

As we enter the fall season, there are a few steps we should take to ensure a safe and comfortable transition into our most colorful time of the year. This is the time of year we should have heating systems checked to make sure they are running safely and efficiently. This step can prevent carbon monoxide poisoning due to a faulty furnace. The best practice is to have a professional service technician clean and inspect your heating units annually.

This is also the time of year many of us use our wood burning stoves or fireplaces to take the morning chill out of the air. Have you cleaned your flues? Has a professional checked your chimney for cracks? These steps should be done on an annual basis. It is also important to use the fireplace screen. When storing wood near the fireplace or stove, make sure it is a safe distance from the heat of the device. When cleaning the ashes from the fireplace or stove make sure you use a metal pail with a cover to transport the ashes (which may still be hot) to the outside of the house. Every year house fires start when people store ashes and coals that are not fully extinguished in a non metal container close to their home or garage. Please store the ashes away from any combustible materials or ideally outside of the house in a covered metal container until you are certain that they are not smoldering.

When raking leaves do not pile them up and burn them. This is in violation of town codes and therefore is not a legal or a safe practice to engage in. Leaves are very light and will readily travel with the slightest breeze. When you factor in that leaves may be burning when they become airborne, you have the potential for an unwanted fire at some other location.

## EAST ROCHESTER OFFICE OF LOCAL HISTORY

The Office of Local History provides historical walking tours for the school, maintains a complete inventory of the Gagashoan (high school yearbook) from 1931 to the present, full copies of the East Rochester Herald and Post and other newspapers and is open for individuals to research matters of historical nature. 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### EAST ROCHESTER PARKS COMMITTEE

The parks of East Rochester comprise a most valuable resource. The goal of the Parks Committee is to preserve, enhance and enlarge those areas, and to encourage the community to use and improve them as well. The Committee has worked hand-in-hand with the DPW since 2006, on a volunteer basis, to keep our parks at their best. Everyone can help us reach our goal by volunteering to help on a project, making suggestions or donating money or time.

**Park Bench Program** Individuals, businesses, families or any other organizations may elect to sponsor a commemorative bench in the park of their choice. These hand-worked, cast steel benches are six feet long and seat three people comfortably. They are durable for all seasons, with a dark green finish. Each bench is marked with a plaque denoting the sponsor and date of installation. So far, fourteen benches have been added to our parks.

The benches are functional and beautiful, and reflect the Village's pride in our parks. The cost of sponsoring a bench is \$1200. This includes the bench itself, out of state delivery, assembly, commemorative plaque and installation.

**Memorial Tree Program** The landscape of our parks has changed over time, and it's our trees that have reflected that the most. Many of our trees have been lost to old age, severe storms and erosion. Besides providing a lifetime of natural beauty, they keep the surrounding air cool during hot weather, allow habitats for birds, and offer unique spots for picnickers.

It is the Parks Committee's goal to see that our parks retain their forested areas, and we establish new plantings where needed. Currently, we are re-establishing the major hardwoods such as white and red oak to the park. The memorial trees are usually three to four-year old established trees when planted. Included in the \$200 sponsor cost is a plaque, mounted to a stone, set at the base of the tree.

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### ER YOUTH ACTIVITY CENTER

In early April, we began preparations for the Summer of Youth Employment and Training Program. Local business proprietors received a letter explaining the program and an application to participate. The following businesses again signed up, demonstrating the benefits of the program: Linden East Condominiums Association, Village Fair, Valenti Sports, Heritage Christian Services/A Second Thought Resale Shop, Rubino's Italian Submarines, Penfield Place, ER Department of Public Works (DPW), ER Local History, ER Resource Center, ER Public Library, ER Junior/Senior High School Office, ER High School Guidance Office and ERYAC Rent a Kid. We want to recognize the establishments who this year became affiliated for the first time: A plus Sunoco, Bible School at Trinity St. Matthias Church, Bistro 135, Inc., Mac's Philly Steaks, Strands Hair Studio and Whacky Buttons. All benefited with free labor sponsored by ERYAC and paid for by grants through Rochester Works. In return, our youths became acquainted with the working world. The businesses taught leadership, responsibility and business skills. They shared their knowledge and expertise, and our youth came away with valuable lessons that will last their whole lives. A Win – Win Situation for all!

A total of 31 youth participants went into our neighborhoods exhibiting good will, integrity, and a commitment to our community. Proof of the program's success is in the hiring of Stephanie Glaza and Zack Emerick by Village Fair and Zack Stone by Mac's Philly Steaks. David Pomar was given extra hours during the summer by Bistro 135. (He is now in college.) Another benefit to the program is businesses earn a tax credit when they hire the youth as an employee. Please know we are not always able to accommodate your request. Applications are being accepted for the 2011 program. To guarantee your place with the program, please call Barbara Maine at 586-1003.

A great deal of planning and training goes on before and during the six weeks of the program.

Prior to our youth going into job placements, they are required to attend job readiness training, an interview and are given a list of job and job descriptions availabilities. They rank their top three worksite interests. Center staff members work to make the best match between businesses and youth based on youth's career interests and job ranking.

At the beginning of the program, our youth were expected to attend six weeks of job readiness and healthy life styles training for a 2.5 hours a week. Participants were trained on the following topics: Communications and Presentation, Reality Ride, Money Management, Questions and Answers about Police Work with ER Chief Tando, Leadership, Self Esteem and Program Evaluation. Ten OSHA classes were offered and 18 of our youth attended and received a certificate for successful completion. Each youth was assigned a CIT (Counselor In Training). These are young supervisors who presently attend college. They were positive role models. We had three CITs who each mentored 10-11 participants. Each week they met with their assigned participants and worked on youth's goals for the summer. Goals included career search, tutoring, college search and finding a part time job. All participants were required to develop a resume. Interested youth had an opportunity to attend the Summer Institute at St. John Fisher College. Eight of our youth received information on the (general) college application process. We went on a tour of the St. John Fisher's campus and had lunch there.

Our youth served the community in several ways. Youth worked for 4 days washing police cars and assisted with the 5k race. The Center hosted two social gatherings for the School of the Holy Childhood, on July 26 and August 3rd. Altogether 45 people from School of the Holy Childhood joined in the day of fun. Our youth and guests worked on a community service project to benefit St. Joseph's Neighborhood Center. About 50 boxes of personal items were put together and donated. We also played games, amused one another in interesting conversation and took a group photo. After a delicious lunch, our guests went home smiling and our youth went happily on to a Buffalo Bills practice at St. John Fisher College.

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On Tuesday October 26, from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm, at Quinzi Lodge in Eyer Park, we host the Halloween Party for pre-school – 5 grades. This event is sponsored by the Village of East Rochester and hosted by Cub Scout Pack 67 and ERYAC. Come join the FUN! Games, Prizes and FREE Cider and Donuts!

## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The STAR Exemption is a New York State partial school tax exemption. All homeowners are entitled to a Basic STAR exemption on their primary residence. Once you apply for Basic STAR you do NOT need to renew it on a yearly basis unless you change your residence.

Senior Citizens age 65 or older are eligible to apply for Enhanced STAR. The amount of Enhanced STAR exemption received is based on income. To qualify for Enhanced Star the income limit is \$79,050 (adjusted gross income from 2009 tax return). Senior citizens who have lower incomes may qualify for additional exemptions. Enhanced Star Renewal applications will be mailed out in December 2010.

STAR applications are available at the Assessor's office or printed from the New York State Office of Real Property website at [www.orps.state.ny.us/](http://www.orps.state.ny.us/) (under exemption forms).

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October is also Fire Prevention Month. This is the time of year the Fire Department reminds our students of the importance of being fire safe at home. By taking the time, with just a few simple steps we can all make sure our houses and loved ones are protected when we are home. The next step is to have an evacuation plan for the household in the event of a fire and to practice the plan with the members of the household. The last step is to test the detectors at least once a month.

### Fall Leaf Collection Schedule and Guidelines for Curbside Leaf Pick Up

**Mid October - Mid December 2010**

Curbside leaf pick up will begin approximately mid October and run to mid December, weather permitting. We will collect your leaves from the curb in the following manner:

**Large leaf piles:** We will collect your large piles of leaves at the curb using a leaf vacuum machine. Please place your leaf piles between the sidewalk and curb for collection. Do not place your leaf piles in the road, as they pose a hazard for drivers and children, and can clog up the storm drains. Please do not mix any yard debris, garbage, brush or branches with the leaf piles, as they can damage our equipment. Be patient with us when you put out a leaf pile. It usually takes us one week with two trucks to make one pass through the entire Village.

**Bagged Leaves:** Residents are encouraged to bag their leaves whenever possible, using clear plastic bags or recyclable paper bags. Bagged leaves will be picked up on your regular scheduled garbage collection day with a separate truck. Wet leaves can become very heavy, therefore we have a maximum weight limit of 50 pounds per bag. Each bag of leaves is hand loaded onto a truck for disposal. Please be considerate of our workers when placing your leaf bags out for collection. Do not place leaves in a garbage can, as we cannot efficiently collect them.

Please consider your neighbors when putting items at the curb for pick up. Placing items at the curb for pick up in a neat and orderly manner benefits everyone, and allows us to provide all residents with the best possible service.
