**FROM THE TOWN/VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR:
NYS GRANT TO PAY FOR UPGRADES IN EDMUND LYON, EYER PARKS**

The Town/Village of East Rochester was very fortunate to be awarded a grant from New York state as part of an annual competition for funding sponsored by Gov. Cuomo's Regional Economic Development Council. Statewide there are 11 regions; ER is part of the Finger Lakes region, which came in fourth and was recognized as a Top Performer with an award of \$80.7 million to support 100 projects. East Rochester was awarded \$278,962 as part of a \$371,950 grant submission to enhance Edmund Lyon and Legion Eyer parks.

Over the past three years as part of the Governor's job creation and community development initiatives, ER has received funding supporting many different programs. Funds were awarded for the new Eyer Building and Library, digitization of records in the Building Department, and new record-storage facilities for both the Clerk's Office and Court.

The Parks grant will provide a new splash park in Edmund Lyon Park, across from the Kate Gleason Memorial Pool. In Eyer Park, a new lower parking lot with lighting will be developed in the existing basketball court area, and a new basketball court will be installed. Both parks will also see the addition of picnic tables, bike racks, outdoor grills, dog waste stations, and more trees.

The best part of this grant is that it allows the Town/Village a two-year window to complete the work, scheduled to begin this summer. The grant is a 75/25 match, and the State allows our 25 % match to be a combination of in-kind work, Town/Village funds, and donations from organizations like the Parks Committee and Kiwanis.

I would be remiss if I didn't thank all those individuals, families, businesses, and volunteer committees who are responsible for helping with the grant application process. Several community forums were held, and valuable input helped shape a plan that ultimately was funded. Without community input and the vision the Board of Trustees demonstrated, this project could never have become a reality.

FROM the BUILDING DEPARTMENT

Grass, Weeds, and General Property Maintenance: Town/Village Code requires that grass be maintained at a height of less than 6 inches. New York state Property Maintenance Code also addresses maintenance of structures and surrounding property areas. All structural components (such as roofs, gutters, protective treatment [paint and siding], doors, windows, porches, etc.) must be maintained and in good condition. Exterior property areas must be maintained in a clean, safe, and sanitary condition.

Building Permits: Permits are required for sheds, fences, decks, roof replacement, plumbing, retaining walls, driveways, pools, building additions, and new construction. All pools (including inflatable pools) are subject to NYS law if they are capable of holding water at a depth of 24 inches. Please call the Building Department, 385-3513, before starting any construction project to find out if a permit is required. We are the best place to research your future projects to see if permits are required. We act as an independent third party between you and your contractor to ensure that both parties' interests are protected. We will review and inspect your project to ensure it's built correctly and satisfies all NYS code requirements. Permit requirements and forms can be found on our Website, under Building Inspector. Building permits can be acquired at our office from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm weekdays. The contractor performing the work must apply for the permit, and proof of General Liability and Workers' Compensation insurance must be supplied before the permit can be issued.

Marriage licenses are available from our office. Both potential spouses must be present, and have current photo ID and proof of birth/age (we accept birth certificates with a raised seal, or Baptismal certificates). If there was a previous marriage(s), we must see all divorce decrees, annulment papers, or death certificates. The fee is \$40 (cash or check only, as we do not accept credit cards). News from the E.R. Youth Activity Center (for students in grades 5-12)

We at the Youth Activity Center have been very busy since our move to our new Main Street location. When the Youth Center reopened we also expanded the age range we serve: we're now open to fifth-graders and up.

Over the past few months we've hosted several parties for the kids in ER: the Valentine's Day celebration was a big success, and on St. Patrick's Day kids and staff alike were able to enjoy some shamrock shakes and Irish music.

The staff at the Youth Center have also been hard at work putting together their annual **Summer Youth Training and Employment Program**. For those businesses not familiar with the program, it's an opportunity for 20 youth in the ER community to work 15 hours a week at a town/village business and receive five hours of work readiness training at the Center. This gives them the opportunity to have a mentor to help them through the challenges a new/first job can present. It's also a great opportunity to give back to the community, and is free to all businesses. (We pay the youth to work with you!) Some of the many businesses that have participated in the past are Village Fair, the ER Library and Department of Public Works, Linden East Condominiums, Good Smoke Barbeque, the ER Junior/Senior High School Office and Guidance Office, and Day Camp in the Park. Letters to potential business participants have been mailed out; if you have not received one but are interested, please don't hesitate to contact the Youth Center.

We have had much success with our **year-round education/employment support program** as well. We have helped four students obtain employment through local businesses; in addition, three students passed their readiness test for the High School Equivalency exam and are awaiting their test date in June. Danielle Crawford successfully passed her HSE test and has applied to college for the fall. Eugene Schlesing has been accepted into the Job Corps in Albany, where he will be pursuing a certificate in security. We wish them the best of luck in their next endeavors!

In early January we contacted the **Al-Anon** program to discuss the possibility of having **Alateen** meetings in ER, to support teens who are living with, or are close to, anyone affected by alcohol or drug abuse. Our annual **End-of-Summer Clothing Sale** is scheduled for Wednesday, Aug. 19 through Friday, Aug. 21, at 333 E. Chestnut St. Our usual price of \$2 a bag for most clothing has been consistent for more than 25 years. This sale is necessary to make room for incoming seasonal clothing, because of our limited storage space. The sale, held twice a year, is the only time we ever sell clothing. Many of our clients who are eligible for free clothing won’t take advantage of this service. But they will come in when we have the sale, and take pride in knowing they paid for what they got – which is the reason we’ve kept the cost at a minimum for these past 25 years. East Rochester Town/Village Court is in session every Monday beginning at 4:30 pm to hear criminal, civil, and small claims matters, as well as parking and traffic cases.

The Court Clerk’s Office is on the third floor of the Town/Village Hall, and is open from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm weekdays. The Court has two part-time justices who share the caseload, Judge Terrence Brown-Steiner and Judge David Bonacchi. The office is staffed by two full-time clerks: Michon Ball is the clerk for Judge Bonacchi and Jackie Root is the clerk for Judge Brown-Steiner. You can reach them at 585-385-2576; their fax is 419-8285. People attending Court proceedings are greeted by our two Court officers, John Sirianno and Rick Slater.

The ER Court has jurisdiction over cases involving all misdemeanors and violations that occur within the Town/Village of ER. The Court also has jurisdiction over cases involving summary proceedings (landlord/tenant evictions), small claims up to \$3,000, and municipal ordinance violations, including parking tickets.

For payment the Court accepts only cash, money orders, and credit cards (on which NYS has imposed a 2.99% fee); personal checks are not accepted.

On a much lighter note, our judges are available to perform weddings – please contact us for details!

NEWS FROM THE E.R. SENIOR CENTER: The members of the Jean Daniel Senior Citizens Center are gradually adding our own personality to our new space in the Eyer Building. Although the dance floor is smaller, there’s a large and growing group who line dance every Monday morning. The choir, which meets at 10:45 am Fridays, has been opened to the community – anyone who likes to sing is invited to join them.

We now have a lovely reading alcove with books, magazines, and comfortable chairs. It’s a great spot to sit and unwind.

Our spaghetti dinner and Pinewood Derby, in which seniors make their own cars and compete for the fastest time, is planned for September. Our white elephant and craft sale is scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 3. Everyone is invited to browse; soup and chili will be available for sale at lunch time. The East Rochester Police Department's **non-emergency hours of operation** are 8:30 am to 4:30 pm weekdays; we are closed on weekends and holidays. We are also pleased to announce our **new pharmaceutical drop-off box**, outside the Police Clerk's window in the lower atrium of the Eyer Building. This red box is available when the building is open, for the public to drop off any old or unused pills; no liquids or needles are allowed. In addition to this drop box, we still offer our service where we accept all types of medications, including liquids and needles, the third Wednesday of every month. We are sad to announce the recent retirement of our beloved Police Clerk **Barbara Montcrieff**, who dedicated more than 25 years to the ERPD. Other recent retirees from the Department are Barb's husband, Officer **Scotty Montcrieff** (who also served as the School Resource Officer), and **Lt. 2015 finds ER Community News TV-12 celebrating its 21st anniversary, and in a new location (in the lower level of the Eyer Building). Our new facility provides us with a brand-new shooting studio, operations/programming area, and state-of-the-art editing suite. Now producers from each of the four communities we represent (ER, Pittsford, and Fairport/Perinton) can come in to shoot a program, edit and master it, and leave it for scheduling.

We could never have grown to this size, and have had so much success over these 21 years, without the efforts of the 28 volunteers we have on staff. To recap 2014, we produced 180 new shows – an average of more than three new shows each week. More than 1,200 volunteer hours went into the production of these shows, and another 400 hours went into the coordination, administration, and scheduling of the content seen every day on Channel 12. No other cable access station in Monroe County comes close.

Major volunteers of note include **Ralph Morabito** and **Barry Nenzo**, who produced more than 30 new 'One On One' and 'Village Gardener' shows. A number of these programs included people from Pittsford, Fairport, and Perinton, to interest viewers from our newly expanded broadcast area. They also covered several out-of-ER events, including Fairport's annual Memorial Day parade and ceremony. Barry served double duty by also shooting and editing all the ER Town/Village Board meetings and many of our annual events, including two running fundraisers narrated by **Al Buckner**. The tag team of **Jerry and Mary Cilento** covered interviews with and about businesses, people, and events throughout ER and surrounding communities for their show, 'All About Town.' They also covered the full day of the ER Christmas Festival, which Mary was the inspiration for several years ago. **Teresa Quinzi-Willette**, co-producer of 'All About Town,' did all the editing for the programs, as well as shooting and editing for her own show, 'God With Us.' Our high school sports crew did a bang-up job covering most of the home games for ER/Gananda football and ER boys' and girls' varsity basketball. They also covered several field hockey and lacrosse games, as well as produced the weekly 'Bombs Away,' featuring head football coach **Dennis Greco**. We've gotten a lot of great compliments on the professional efforts of **Dave Altman, Dave Conley, Tom Dezio, Jim Hauser, and Jeff Renner** (along with special announcer appearances from **Jim Benson** and **Sue Dezio**). Newest volunteer **Ariane DiNatale** has also been putting in many hours shooting, editing, and archiving old programs. Please be sure to thank our volunteers when you see them. Without their efforts, there would be no ERCN TV-12!

TV-12 is funded by Time Warner franchise fees and contributions from the neighboring municipalities of Fairport and Pittsford, who both share our broadcast. You can find TV-12 on Time Warner Cable channels 12 and 98.4. FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

SPRING/SUMMER COLLECTION SCHEDULE and GUIDELINES for YARD DEBRIS, BRUSH, BRANCHES from mid-April through mid-October:

Yard debris (yard rakings, grass clippings, and leaf piles) will be picked up weekly on your regular garbage collection day. All yard debris must be in either clear plastic bags or recyclable paper bags. Please do not put yard debris in piles at the curb, or in garbage cans – it must be properly bagged for collection.

Leaf piles are not allowed at the curb for pickup any time except October to December, which is the only time the leaf truck and vacuum is used. All leaves must be properly bagged to avoid a special pickup fee.

Brush and branches will be picked up once a week – usually on Mondays, when we cover the entire Town/Village. Please place brush and branches between the curb and sidewalk in a neat, orderly manner, and please do not mix any other yard debris or garbage in with the brush and branches.

Please be considerate of your neighbors when putting refuse at the curb for pickup. Placing items in a neat, orderly manner benefits everyone, and allows us to provide all residents with the best possible service.

GARBAGE PICKUP: *When can I put garbage out for collection?* Your weekly trash should be placed at the curb no later than noon the day before your pickup day, and no later than 7 am the day of your pickup day.

What's the proper way to put out garbage for collection? All garbage should be properly contained. Garbage cans can be no larger than 35 gallons and cannot exceed 50 pounds per can; if plastic trash bags are used, they cannot exceed 50 pounds per bag. Please don't place at the curb for pick up any items that aren't properly contained. Loose material is unsightly and reduces the efficiency of our collection.

What do I do if my garbage wasn't picked up? First check to see if a yellow sticker was left on your can or bag. This sticker will explain why your items were left. We will not pick up illegal cans or bags for safety reasons. If there's a yellow sticker, please resolve the problem and call for a pickup. If there isn't yellow sticker, it's possible it was put out after we came by, or we missed it. Please call us and we will return.

What types of items am I allowed to put out for pickup? Your weekly garbage pickup is for the trash you generate in a normal week. Simply stated, any item you don't normally put at the curb every week is considered bulk, and could result in a special pickup fee. Some examples of bulk items are carpet, mattresses and bedding, furniture, wood debris, concrete, blacktop, dirt, sod, large and some small appliances, and construction or demolition material. E-waste, household and outdoor chemicals, paints, cleaners, degreasers, or any other hazardous waste are not allowed at any time.

Can I call to arrange for a special pickup, or do I have to wait for bulk week? You can call any time to arrange for either a special pickup, or to find out what other options are available to you.

SPECIAL PICKUP FEES: With the exception of large commercial users, any property that exceeds 12 standard 32-gallon trash cans or bags of refuse in any one week will be charged our standard special pick-up fees. Fees are based on the amount of cans, bags, or bulk, and will increase depending on the amount placed at the curb.

When bulk refuse or other refuse material is placed at the curb at a time or in a manner not allowed under the law, the refuse will be removed and the property owner will be subject to a fee or fine for its removal. Fines for non-compliance are as follows: \$25 for the first offense, \$50 for the second offense, \$75 for the third offense, \$100 for the fourth offense and each additional offense thereafter; additional amounts can be charged based on the amount and type of material out for pickup. Offenses are tabulated annually, from April 1 of the current year through March 31 of the following year. Every April 1, each property begins a new year with zero offenses, unless there is a history of repeat offenses (as determined by the Town/Village). Special pick-up fees must be paid within 60 days from the date of the invoice; unpaid special pick-up fees will be added to the property owner's Town/Village tax bill.

BULK PICKUP: *What's bulk pickup week?* Bulk pickup week is when you're allowed to put at the curb any items that aren't allowed during your normal garbage collection. Please, at no time is any contractor's debris allowed – all contractors should remove their own debris. Examples of bulk items are large appliances, furniture, carpet, and concrete. Please call us if you're not sure what constitutes a bulk item.

When is bulk pickup week? Bulk pickup week is the first full week of every month except July, September, and November, on your regular scheduled garbage day. We will pick up your bulk only on your regular garbage day or sooner; any bulk put out after your normal day will incur a collection fee. **Upcoming bulk weeks are June 1-5, Aug. 3-7, Oct. 5-9, and Dec. 7-11.**

When can I put out bulk items? They can be put out no earlier than the Saturday before the bulk pickup week. We allow this because we understand sometimes there isn't enough time for people to put bulk items out the night before their regular pickup day. Only bulk items are allowed to be out before your regular garbage collection day.
